New School Drivers

Those of you with eagle-eyes would have spotted a change to our school drivers last week, when the curriculum grids were sent out by teachers to inform you what your child is learning this half term.

After a collective meeting with teachers across the Federation, we felt that adding 'Legacy and Making a Difference' to the core drive of our curriculum would be an effective way to teach children about role-models who have changed the world in their own way. Already, Year 5.6 have been learning about Katherine Johnson, the mathematician whose calculations sent the first astronauts

into space. We feel that including this focus in our curriculum will not only teach children about these important people but will instil in them the idea that they too can make a difference.

Class News

Tyne Class

Tyne Class have had lots of fun over the last few weeks learning about night and day. We have been thinking about who works at night and which animals come out at night. We enjoyed reading the story 'Whatever Next!' the children have used props to act out the story in the role play area. The children were fantastic at asking who, what, how and why questions when hot seating the character Baby Bear. Someone asked, "why didn't you take your mum to the moon with you?" In maths we have been mastering the number zero, the children can represent, identify and write the number zero. We linked this to capacity exploring full, half full, half empty and empty. At home can your child pour full glass of water and then tell you how much is left when they have drank some?

Thames Class

Thames class have enjoyed being back at school. We have been exploring the properties of shape and using 3D shapes to make a tower for Rapunzel. In English year 1 have been turning words from singular to plural. Year 2 have been using commas in lists. Perhaps the children could write their own shopping list to go to the supermarket? In Art we have been using the colour wheel and practised mixing colours. In PE we have continued to practise our gymnastic skills and started to practise skipping. They have definitely shown resilience with skipping.

Rhine Class

This week, we have done some very exciting things. The toothpaste investigation is complete. The children were amazed at how the sugary drink attacked the shell even though it was regularly brushed with toothpaste. They have enjoyed writing their own plays and acting out. We had a thought tunnel in guided reading where we gave the thoughts of Leila and Lachland. All that and a visit to the Hancock Museum where we consolidated our learning about the Stone Age.

Nile Class

The children in Nile class have covered two topics already in English. Last week, the children used the computers to learn about a special mathematician called Katherine Johnson, ready to write a biography of her life. This week they have started to explore how to write a nonet. Ask your child if they can explain what a nonet is and how it is set out.
