

To be displayed in the hall – The Christian Values with explanations:

Hope: The Christian understanding of hope illustrates how trivial our everyday use of the word can be. We hope that it will not rain for the picnic, or that the car will start or that the plumber will come tomorrow. At a deeper level, hope is a universal human phenomenon. People hope for peace in time of war; food in time of famine; justice in time of oppression. Where hope is lost there is despair and disintegration. Hope generates energy and sustains people through difficult times. For some people, hope is so strong that it inspires self-sacrifice to turn hope into reality. True hope is much more than a general idea that things will get better. It is more than a belief in progress, which sees the world and people as getting better all the time, growing away from violence, ignorance and confusion.

Service: 'Going the extra mile' involves sacrifice, putting ourselves out for someone else's benefit. It is precisely in a life of service that we become most truly free.

Koinonia: Koinonia: fellowship

The use of the original Greek word emphasises the strength and importance of this concept within the Christian faith.

Koinonia means 'that which is in common' and is often translated as 'fellowship' or 'community'. Other translations might include 'union', 'partnership', or 'being yoked together'. A yoke is a shaped piece of wood that goes across the shoulders, often linking two animals. By combining their strength, it helps work to be done and burdens to be carried. Koinonia expresses the quality of relationship within the Christian community. They are all members of the same family.

A central element of being a family is interdependence: all are needed and valued and each person is important to the whole.
